



Letter from the Director

Dear friends of the National Lutheran Choir,

Welcome to the 2023 National Lutheran Choir Christmas Festival! We are so grateful to have you with us today. During this holiday season, we invite you to remember the childhood excitement you had as the days turned darker, the weather grew colder, and the sights and sounds of December emerged to greet the season. This Christmas Festival, *New Hope*, provides a chance to remember our own human experience of Christmas alongside the universal story of the birth of Jesus Christ.

New Hope is an earth-changing story in the most unassuming package: a newborn baby. As we begin the performance, you will hear and see the choir emerge from darkness; the world begins in stillness and longs for change in Bradley Ellingobe's arrangement of a Norwegian folk tune set to the text "My heart is longing to praise my Savior." Hope then emerges as Randall Thompson's "Ye Were Sometimes Darkness" calls us to walk as children of light. We greet the birth of Jesus on Christmas morning with Giovanni Gabrieli's setting of "Hodie Christus natus est" (Today Christ is Born) performed conversationally with an antiphonal choir and brass. Finally, we all greet the Christ-child with David Willcocks' arrangement of "O Come, All Ye Faithful."

Images of human reflection and praise continue in the program through settings of familiar texts and carols. Daniel Ficarri's setting of the Canticle of Mary (*Magnificat*) and Canticle of Simeon (*Nunc Dimittis*) bookend the body of the program and extol the delight and hope of humanity in the birth of Jesus. All nature sings in jubilation as we call to another to "come and see" in Undine Smith Moore's "I Believe This Is Jesus." We follow the joy of the season around the globe in songs representing composers from Namibia and South Korea as well as a beloved setting of "O Little Town of Bethlehem" by Stephen Paulus.

The day becomes night again as we reflect on the foreshadowing of Jesus' life in B.E. Boykin's riveting setting of "Coventry Carol." Elaine Hagenberg's "My Song in the Night" answers as we call on God to comfort us in our darkest moments. Finally, we turn again to the light of hope in Kathleen Thomerson's "I Want to Walk as a Child of the Light." From the apse, the choir sings pieces that reflect the light that shines in all of us.

Woven throughout the performance are reflections of the season through poetry. These are compiled, composed, and spoken by former long-time Minnesota Public Radio Host, Brian Newhouse. This poetry was curated to examine the human aspect of our lives; while our experiences may seem unconnected to the Christmas story, the poetry demonstrates how this story actually intersects with every aspect of our lives.

The final section of the program changes from reflection to action. It asks "What do we do with the hope we have been granted through this story?" The answer: We are each called to share that light with all humanity. Please enjoy *New Hope* today and then share the light with all those you touch this holiday season.


There is no intermission during *New Hope*. When possible, please only leave or enter the performance space during spoken reflections or transitional music to help preserve the concert experience of those around you.



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The National Lutheran Choir

The National Lutheran Choir is rooted in its mission to celebrate, invigorate, and expand sacred choral music, bringing inspiration and meaning to people of diverse faiths and backgrounds. Founded in 1986 by the late Larry Fleming, grown under the direction of David Cherwien from 2002-2023, and now led by Jennaya Robison, the National Lutheran Choir sings a spiritual story through diverse repertoire including selections from early chant and simple folk anthems to complex choral masterworks and new compositions. Currently in its 38th year, the National Lutheran Choir features a roster of more than 65 volunteer singers from various backgrounds and faith traditions. In addition to concertizing in the Twin Cities and on annual tours, the choir serves a national audience through artfully produced digital content, concert livestreams, and other releases on YouTube, as well as through a Virtual Subscription program. A discography of 36 recordings showcases the ensemble's music making over the years and presents hymns, choral classics, contemporary works, spirituals, and major new works commissioned by the National Lutheran Choir. Much of this influential new work is featured in MorningStar Music Publishers' collection, the "National Lutheran Choir Series." The National Lutheran Choir has been honored with the Wittenberg Award from the Luther Institute, Chorus America's Margaret Hillis Award, and the Dale Warland Singers Commissioning Award.

Jennaya Robison, Artistic Director

Dr. Jennaya Robison is the Artistic Director of the National Lutheran Choir and is a highly accomplished conductor, educator, and vocalist. She holds a Doctor of Musical Arts in choral conducting from the University of Arizona, a Master of Music in conducting and voice from the University of New Mexico, and an undergraduate degree in music (education and voice) from Luther College. Her extensive work in the field of choral conducting includes serving as the Raymond R. Neevel/Missouri Associate Professor and Director of Choral Studies at the University of



Missouri-Kansas City Conservatory until 2023, Associate Professor of Choral Music at Luther College from 2013 to 2020, and founding Scottsdale Musical Arts in 2009.

In demand as a clinician and guest speaker, Robison frequently appears at regional and national choral conferences and seminars; regularly leads All State and honor choirs, workshops, and festivals; and has taught courses in choral singing and global connection in the United States, Namibia, South Africa, Germany, and an upcoming festival in Italy (2024). She is the editor of the National Lutheran Choir Series with MorningStar Music Publishers as well as the Jennaya Robison Series with Pavane Publishing and is an active composer and arranger of choral music. Robison has served as soloist and chorister with the Dale Warland Singers, True Concord Voices, Spire Chamber Ensemble, the Tucson Symphony, and many other ensembles. She is the national chair of Music in Worship for the American Choral Directors Association, a member of Chorus America, and has held leadership positions at Lutheran churches in Arizona, Missouri, Iowa, and Minnesota.
